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WELCOME TO CHAPMAN CHATTER

Comments from your editors

Chapman is the fourth surname on which we have undertaken extensive data collection and information exchange with people such as you all over the nation. It represents our third newsletter endeavor. We are learning early in our program that the Chapmans drastically outnumber the Newkirks Alfords and Newsoms on which we are also working.

Having established two way communications with over 150 of you, it became apparent that there was a very definite need for a means of communication between all of you who are interested in Chapman. We expect you to consider this your publication. We need you to tell us what you like and what you don't like. We need even more for you to send us information that you want to share with others who have that common Chapman interest.

There are a few things that we need to get on record in this first issue. First, We became interested in our ancestors much too late in life, and began just last year. Second, we are not journalists or publishers. Until we became involved with our family newsletters, closest experience we had was working on the high school paper over forty years ago. Third, we are not infallible. Some might even say we are error prone. We will do our utmost to keep errors in the newsletters to a minimum. Dealing with such a volume of proper manes and dates, makes proof-reading very difficult. We have no way of authenticating the information sent by you and your associates. indicate that something is not proven or is questionable, we will try to qualify it in publication with "??." If you find that we, or our contributors, have made an error, please let us know so that publish a correction in a later issue. Fourth, we are not independently wealthy nor are we working as part of a funded foundation. When we started our newsletters last year, they were short and our readers were few, therefore they were circulated free. The page numbers and the readers increased, and the costs increased drastically. We could not afford to continue on our retirement income, thus the subscription Fifth, we need all the Chapman information you can send us. We would ask that if you send information that is copyright protected that you tell us so that the copyright will not be violated. The newsletters are not copyrighted and you may use the material or make copies. We would appreciate credit where appropriate. If others wish to have copies, we can provide originals for just about your costs in making copies. We will try to maintain a file of back-issues for those occasions when you or others want an extra copy.

We need a name for all of you collectively. You will see on pages 10 to 15 that most of you are not Chapmans per se. It would not be fair to call you Chapman and it gets to be a problem calling you contacts or correspondents. We have chosen the name Chappie as a name for those who are involved with us in this effort. If you have a better name that is short, descriptive, and all encompassing we would like to hear from you.

The newsletter will contain information from and about many Chappies who are not subscribers. Subscribers will be given priority and preference in newsletter coverage. Our percentage of subscribers vs contacts is much less with Chapman than with our other lines. Unless we have a significant increase in this first year, it is possible that we will not try to continue into the second year. If you know of others who might be interested, and if you think the publication is worthwhile, please tell them about us. We are extending the \$10 introductory offer until our advertisement is published in THE GENEALOGICAL HELPER.

The Chapman Exchange on pages 4 to 7 will run four pages or more until we can catch up with the backlog that was accumulated before we started publication. As you read the inquiries on these pages, don't overlook our comments at the top of page 4.

The lineage table on pages 10 to 15 is a one-time feature. It permits you to see the direct Chapman ancestry of almost all of the current Chappies. As new Chappies are added to our number we will give their lineage in the exchange. The format of the lineage table beginning on page 10 is self-explanatory, but if you have trouble, find your name or that of your spouse in the left column. Notice the headings across the top identifying the ancestral relationship. On your line will be shown the first name of your Chapman ancestor and below their name, the year and place of birth, if known. Once you understand your line, the others are similar.

At least two Chapman family lines will be featured in each issue. See pages 8 & 9 and 16 & 17. Because of the family size, and the limited space available, these will be run in series and continued over several or many issues. The charts on the left page and the family group records or genealogies—on the right page will usually not cover the same segments of the family in the same issue. The coverage in the charts on the left are governed by technical charting considerations. The family group records—will run in sequence by generation. Much of the information in these pages comes from very old records (over 100 years old in these particular cases). If you have correcting or supplementary information—we—would appreciate your sending it in so that it can be shared with others.

In addition to information about our Chapman ancestors, we would like to include interesting current Chapman information. One such item would deal with Chapman family reunions. We would like to print announcements in advance of the reunion, and then with the help of one or more of the participants, publish reports of the reunions. We know about two Chapman reunions that were held recently. The descendants of William W. Chapman met June 25 at Ephesus Primitive Church in Worth County, GA. There was another reunion July 24th at Three Forks Baptist Church in Alexander (previously Wilkes) County, North Carolina. This group is probably identified as the descendants of John Chapman of that county. Won't you tell us about your current Chapman events so we can pass them on to others.

You may expect some delayed reaction on any of your comments in the newsletter. Copies—are—made available to the Library of Congress, other libraries, and genealogical socities. As these copies go into their reference collection, they may be read years in the future by someone who will contact you. If you have a library or society to which you would recommend we send complimentary copies, give us—their—name and address, and tell us why you think we should make such a contribution.

We will normally try to mail the newsletter to subscribers during the first week of February, May, August and November. There will be occasions where events beyond our control cause some delay, but you can expect they will always be mailed sometime during the month mentioned.

Give particular attention to the Chapman inventory described on page 24. This program which will culminate in a computer file (and printouts) of every Chapman in the 1850 census is likely to be one of the most useful tools you and future generation Chapman researchers have available. It will succeed only to the extent that you help us. Notice that we have data on only 15 of the possible 40 states involved and already have 1796 Chapman families identified. If we can expect the Chapman per state ratio to continue we can project the total 1850 families to be about 4777. We are probably looking at something over 30,000 Chapmans who were living in 1850. If we live long enough, and get enough of your help, we will eventually have them all on our consolidated record.

(A BOOK REVIEW)

This well documented account of one of our distinguished Chapman lines begins with John Chapman who died in Spotsylvania County, Virginia in December 1775. It continues through several branches of the family down to the current period. Most of the book is devoted to the descendants of Thrashley (Streshley) Chapman, Mrs. Edmonds ancestor, and a son of John Chapman by his second wife, Mary Allen.

The book contains much source material and is not limited to just the vital statistics of the many families listed. There are numerous photographs. The families are arranged by family, rather than by generation, using a numbering system with arabic numbers denoting the generations and the families within the generation, and lower case arabic numbers to denote the issue of each family.

There are 389 pages of text, and an extensive list of sources. The index, with about 6000 entries runs for 30 pages and has over three pages of Chapmans with about 800 names. The 6 x 9 x 1 inch book is bound in a beautiful red hard back and is printed on the finest slick paper that Elsie could find. It is available for \$17 from Mrs. N. N. (Billie Dixon) Hardy 2911 Kircaldy Court, Arlington, TX 76015: Would like to contact any descendants of WILLIAM CHAPMAN, JR born May 1819 in Kentucky, married Eliza Mary Jane OWENS and died probably in St. Clair County, Missouri. Also need marriage place and date of his daughter Mary Ann to James Harris.

1. At the commencement of these researches it was supposed that William Chapman, of New London, might be a near relative of Robert Chapman of Say-Brook, but on further investigation, no evidence has been found that they were kinsmen. It is not known from whence William came. He appears first on the New London records, in 1657.

In the book of town grants, appears the filowing: "Milliam Chapman hath given him thirty ackers of upland bounded towards the south with Ar. Douglas his land, and towards the east with the small brook that leads to Jordan River, and towards the north with Arkaubukie Meadow, and towards the west with a ledge of rocks and a tree marked on four sides." The above grant was made at a meeting in 1633.

At a town-meeting, August 25, 1691, it was "Voated that whereas William Chapman had formerly allowed him by the town three pounds for his sexton's place by the yeare, they now add forty shillings more and order him five pounds per year for sweeping the meeting house and galleries and ringing the bell."

He died the 18th of December, 1699.

The following is a copy of his will presented in the court of probate soon after his decease. It furnisheds the only clue to the makes of his children, as they are not recorded in the town records:

"The last Will and Testament of William Chapman, of New London.

"I William Chapman of New London senior, being sick and weak of body, but threw the goodness of God, in perfect memory and good understanding, do make this my last Will and Testament revoking and making void all others: first I resime up my sole to God who gave it and my body to the ground to be buried decently and handsomely, and what of the things of this world God hath grasmsly given me I despose of as follweth, first I will that all my just debts be honestly discharged and payd, and as to ey funeral charges I will that they be discharged next.

"Item, 1 give unto my eldest son John Chapman, a double portion of $\mbox{\ \ may}$ estate.

"Item, I give unto my son Milliam his equal proportion with his brothers allowing John his double portion as afore of my estate.

"Item, I give unto my son Samuel his equal proportion of my estate with his brothers allowing his eldest brother John as abovesaid.

*Item, I give to my son Jeremiah Chapman his equal proportion of my estate with his brothers allowing John as abovesaid.

"Item, I give to my son Joseph Chapman an equal proportion of my estate with his brothers allowing his eldest brother as abovesaid.

"Item, I give unto my two daughters, Sarah and Rebeccah, all the utensils and moveable household stuff, within or that belongs to ye house, to be equally divided between them; next I will that my son Jeremiah, if he please, have my house and home lot, paying out to his brothers the several legacys I have given them by this my last Will and Testament. I appoint my son Jeremiah Chapman to be the Executor of this my last Will and Testament, in witness whereof I have here set to my hand and seal this first day of April 1669.

From the records of the court of probate, it appears that he lived over thirty years after making his will. The inventory of his estate was exhibited in court, (the appraisal bearing date January 2, 1669-70,) amounting to £28 Os. 6d.

According to the will, he had seven children.

- 3 ii. Milliam Chapman Jr., (we estimate birth to be 1654), married Hannah Lester about 1690, four children;

- 5 vi. Joseph Chapman, born 1667, died June 10 1725, warried Marcy June 10 1725, eight children;
- 6 v. Jeremiah Chapman, born 1670, died September 6 1755, married Hannah, eight children;

 - vii. Rebeccah Chapman.

It is not known that Sarah and Rebeccah Chapman were married. "John Lewis and Sarah Chapman were presented to the court in 1670, for sitting together on the Lord's day, under the apple tree in Goodman Chapman's orchard."

JOHN CHAPMAN

- 2. John, son of Milliam Chapman, the settler, was born November 1653 and he died after May 1748. He married a lady whose Christian name was Sarah. He removed to Colchester, probably in the year 1706. He deeded property, April 15 1706 in the town of Colchester to his brother Milliam of Mew London. He was living at Colchester in May 1748 when it was observed that he would be 95 years old next November. Of course, he was born in November 1653. There are deeds of lands on Colchester records to six sons, and whether he had daughters, does not appear.

- 13 ii. Jonathan Chapman, removed to Colchester, and is supposed had a family of children, but no record of them has been found. He appears in a deed to Ichabod Chapman, September 29 1763;

 - Mary Chapman, whether she married or not is uncertain.

- 4. Samuel, son of William Chapman, the settler, was born 1655 and he died Movember 2 1758 at the age of 93. He married a lady whose Christian name was Bethiah. He resided in what is called the Cohantic District, and previous to his decease, conveyed his homestead to his his son Mathaniel. He and Bethiah had the following children:
- 14 i. Samuel Chapman, born June 27 1689, married Dina Hatch March 8 1722, eleven children;
- 15 ii. Robert Chapman, born October 21 1691, married Lucretia, two children;
 - iii. Joseph Chapman, born June 20 1694;
 - iv. Joanna Chapman, born July 4 1697;
- 16 v. Peter Chapman, born May 13 1700, estate was settled July 3 1749, two children;
- 17 vi. Ihomas Chapman, born June 1 1702, died 1789, married Miss Steadman about 1728, eight children;
 - vii. Rebecca Chapman, born December 16 1704;
 - viii. Bethiah Chapman, born April 6 1711.

First Generation

EDWARD CHAPMAN

Edward Chapman, miller, of Ipswich, is said to have come from the northeast of England, not far from Hull, in Yorkshire. The probability of this tradition is supported by the facts that others from the same vicinity of the name, Chapman, are recorded, as recommended by their parish priests to be members of the Episcopal Church, and so were permitted by the authorities to leave the country. Edward Chapman and the Puritans of that period could not expect such permission.

He is said to have landed in Boston. In 1642 he married first. Mary, daughter of Mark Symonds, the mother of his five children. She died Jun 10, 1658, and he married second, Dorothy, daughter of Richard Swain, and widom of Thomas Abbott of Rowley, who survived him. He died April 18, 1678. He seems to have been an industribus, energetic, christian man, who accumulated some property, and preferred to keep it in his own hands till he saw how his children would take care of their own earnings. He was cautious, firm and decided in his opinions.

WILL OF EDWARD CHAPMAN, SEN.

In the name of God, Amen, I, Edward Chapman of Ipswich, in the county of Essex, being weake of Rody, but through the mercy of God, Injoying my understanding and Memory, do make and ordain this my last will and testament.

Imprimis. I committ my soule into the hands of Jesus Christ, my blessed Savjour and Redeemer, in hope of a joyful resurrection unto life, at the last day, my body to decent buriall. And for my outward estate, God hath graciously lent unto me, I dispose as followeth; viz. My beloved wife, there being a covenant and contract between us, upon marriage, my will is that it be faithfully fulfilled, twenty pounds of that contained in the covenant, to be in such household goods as she shall desire. Also my will is that my beloved wife Dorothy Chapman shall have the use of the parlour end of the house, both upper and lower roomes, with the little cellar that hath lock and key to it, with free liberty of the oven, and well of water, with ten good bearing fruit trees near that end of the house mch. she is to make use of, to have the fruit off them, also the garden plot fenct in below the orchard, and one quarter of the barne, at the farther end from the house, also to have the goeing of one cow in the pasture, and all during the time she doth remains my widdow. [Dorothy Chapman m. 13 Mov., 1678, Archelaus Moodman of Memburg)

Item. My son Symon, having alreadye done for him beyond my other children, my will is that he shall have thirty pounds payed him, by my executor, as followeth, viz., to be paid five pound a year, to begin the first five pounds three years after my decease, and five every yeare, next after, and this to be his full portion. And for four pounds that is comeing to him of his Grandfather Symonds' gift, which is yet behynd, my will is that it shall be payed unto him, out of that six acre lott lyeing at Mattells neck, with was his grandfather's, as it shall be prized by indifferent men.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Mathaniel Chapman, thirty pounds, to be payed unto him by my executor, by five pound a year, the first five pounds to be payed three years after my decease, and the rest by five pound a year, the next following years; and that to be his full portion.

Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter. Mary, the wife of John Barry, the sum of thirty pounds, to be payed unto her, by five pounds a year, the first five pounds to be payed three years after my decease, and so every year after, five pounds a year, untill it be all payed. All the aforesayd Legacies to be payed in current country pay, unto sd. children. Also I give unto my sayd daughter Mary, one coverlett that is black and yellow.

Item. I appoynt my son, Samuel, to be my sole executor, of this my last will and testament, and do give unto him all my house and lands and chattels, he paying and performing all my will, unto my wife, and borthers and sister as above exprest, and also all my debts and funeral charges. I say I give unto him, my son Samuel Chapman, all the rest of my estate, both reall and personall. My will further is that all my children, shall rest satisfied with what I have done for them, and if any of them shall through

discontent, make trouble about this my will, that then they shall forfeitt and loose what I have herein bequeathed unto them or him, unto them that shall be so molested by them. In witness that tis is my last will and testament, I have heare unto put my hand and seale, this 9th of April, 1678.

- 1. Edward and Mary (Symonds) Chapman, of Ipswich, Ms. In his last days, Edward Chapman had some trouble with his son, Nathaniel. Mark Symonds, his father-in-law, had left with him, in trust, certain lands, which were to be given to his children when they became of age. In Sept., 1677, after he had given John some real estate, Nathaniel sued his father for his share of the legacy left by his grandfather Symonds. By mutual consent, "Dea. Moses Pingry and Symon Stacy of Ipswich, and Ezekiell Northeand, of Rowley," were chosen to divide that land into five equal parts, and Nathaniel was to choose "his share, according to his birth." Some of the other children left their shares in posession of their father till his death, when he made his will, April 9, 1678, he gave Nathaniel another equal share, and added, "My will is that all my children be satisfied with that I have done for them. And if any of them shall, through discontent, make trouble about this, my will is that they shall forfeit and lose what I have herein bequeathed to him or them." They had:

- Nathaniel Chapman, married December 30 1674 Mary Wilborn, called the daughter of Andrew Peters. Mathamiel was a carpenter, and is said to have died July 2 1691;

SAMUEL CHAPMAN

3. Samuel, son of Edward and Mary (Symonds) Chapman, was born 1654 and was a wheelwright and farmer. He married May 20 1678 Ruth, daughter of Samuel Ingals. On the death of his father, April 18, 1678, he was appointed, by the will, "sole executor of the will." He took the homestead, and was allowed three years to settle the estate, and then six years to pay the other heirs, in six annual installments. He then became residuary legatee.

Samuel was a man of piety and influence in the community. His mife, Ruth, died in Ipswich, June 22 1700, and he soon removed with his children to North Hill in Hampton, and settled on a place called Brumble Hill, on the north side of the road to Stratham, where he died January 26 1722.

REUBEN CHAPMAN, son of JOHNATHAN C. CHAPMAN and Dorcas CHUBB was born 1761 in Ashford, Connecticut and he died 1845 in Lodi, Ohio. He married Rhoda Peck. Two of their children were:

- A. LEVI CHAPMAN born 1784 in Ashford, Connecticut and died in Ohio. He married Lucinda TURNER;

In May 1719 he presented to the council of New Hampshire, a petition from the North Hill people for a meeting-house, etc., in their part of the town. The selectmen of Hampton were present to oppose him; but the petition was granted. Owing, however, to some difficulties, the separate organization was not completed till their meeting-house was built, and a church formed, on the 17th of November 1738. So he did not live to see his hopes accomplished. The stone over his grave says, "Samuel Chapman, died Jan.26,1722, in ye 68th year of his age."

The town of North Hampton was incorporated Nobember 26 1742. The pastor settled over this colony was Rev. Nathaniel Gookin, son of the former pastor of the old church in Hampton. They had:

- 7 i. Samuel Chapman Jr, born February 12 1679 Ipswich, married March 11 1702 Phebe Balch, died April 21 1742;
- B ii. John Chapman, born in Ipswich, married March 16 1705 Dorothy, daughter of James and Elisabeth Chase, died October 17 1705;
- iii. Joseph Chapman, born Ipswich April 6 1685 died unmarried in Hampton March 1750, He left lands, etc., and his brother Job administered on the estate;
- iv. Ruth Chapman, born Ipswich January 10 1687, married ___ Eaton, and in 1750 received her share of her brother Joseph's estate;
 - y. Edward Chapman, born in Ipswich died there October 17 1688;
- vi. Mary Chapman, born Ipswich January 2 1691 died March 13 1740 in Hampton unmarried at the age of 49;
- 9 vii. Job Chapman, born Ipswich about 1693 married (1) Mary Chase and (2) Rachel Goss, died 1765;
- viii. Edmund Chapman born Ipswich about 1697. He was a farmer, in company with his brother Joseph. [I have a deed of marsh land sold them in 1725, by Christopher Page. It was inherited by Job, their nephew.__J.C.] He died unmarried in Hampton, February 20 1739, aged 42.

JOHN CHAPMAN

- 4. John, son of Edward and Mary (Symonds) Chapman, married September 30 1675, Rebecca Smith and died 1677. September 1 1677, his father gave him a house and lands, as he said, "in consideration of his dutifulness to me and living with me to the day of date," &c., "dureing the terme of his naturall life, and to his son John Chapman, after him, if he liveth to the age of 21 years." Iwo months after this his son John died, and the property fell, by the deed, into the hands of the widow, Rebecca, till the child became of age. Their son was:
 - john Chapman, born July 7 1676, married October 28 1702 Elizabeth Davis.

CHAPMAN DATA BANK

In each issue we will publish one or more pages from our Chapman data bank. Since we are continually adding to, and making changes in, the data bank, it will never be complete. We will publish the file in it's composition as of the time we are preparing for publication.

In the listing that begins on the facing page, we have loaded most of the pedigree sheets and family group sheets that you have sent us. We have loaded some of the additional data you sent but have loaded few of the larger family lines in total. We have not loaded, into this file, the wealth of information furnished available in the several books we now have.

The information just is not 100% accurate. Although we have tried to keep our portion error free, we are bound to make mistakes with this much data which is very difficult to proof-read. We know that some of your source data was questionable and where it was obvious we have tried to show it with a "?". If you desire more information on any of the entries, or you would like to know our source, just drop us a line or give us a call.

This current listing is our "A-file" and we need to explain the columns. Keep this handy for future issues for we will not repeat this explanation in subsequent issues.

CHAPMAN NAME: This is the first and middle name and/or initials of the principal person whose last name is always CHAPMAN. The list is sequenced first by this column going alphabetical by the first five characters or spaces. Middle names or initials have no real bearing on the sequence. Micknames and alternative spellings are shown in []. If titles such as REV or DR were furnished, and if space permitted they were included.

BORN YMD, MARD YMD & DIED YMD: These date columns are essentially the same showing dates of birth, marriage and death. All are expressed by year then month and then day. In a few instances a Born date may be a date of baptism, but there is no way to distinguish these. If you provided a circa or about date then it is shown with a CA. If a date was expressed as "before" it is shown with a "(" following the date and if it was "after" a date it is followed by a ">". Dates of birth are essential to our processing so when one was not provided, we estimated the date of birth using other data available, so use these with extreme caution. They are followed by an "E". Within each name the list is sequenced on the year and month of birth so that we can keep the entries in approximate chronological order for comparison and analysis.

WHERE BORN, WHERE MARRIED & CITY/CNTY are all columns showing places. All are shown with the state first followed by the county or the city. Abbreviations and shortened spelling were used. The first two need no explanation, but the City/Cnty does as it is used to identify a number of places. These entries are always followed by a lower cased letter which is a code to indicate the event. They should be clear, but let us know if you need help. They generally are b=buried (born is in the other column) d=died, w=will, r=resided, c=census, etc.

SPOUSE: This needs little explanation, you can see that they are last name first. If there was more than one spouse the number of the marriage follows the spouse's name and they are arranged in order.

PARENTS: It doesn't say so, but it should be obvious that these are always Chapmans. The father's name and maybe middle initial are shown first followed by the mother, and to the extent possible, her maiden name. In many cases we sacrificed her first name and used an initial in order for you to see her family name. A blank in this column strongly suggests that the person on the left is the dead-end of someone's Chapman line, and they need your help.

CHAPMAN INVENTORY, 1850

One of our most useful tools is the federal census records. These billions and billions of records are at their best in fragments. Usually we work with a state index for a given year, but it never gives all the information we need. The information on the various family members must come from the detailed schedules prepared by county and by state. Rarely do you find a source that has all of these available at the same place and at the same time.

The purpose of our 1850 inventory of Chapmans, is to bring all of this data together into one record. Although much of the work is going to be done by us, we need your help. We will need copies or extracts from census data you have available in your personal files, and in some cases, may need some of you to do research in sources near you since we do not have the resources locally in the St. Louis area.

The beginning of our project is the national summary by state showing the number of Chapman—families in each state in 1850, as it is reflected in the many indexes available. The first version of that list is on the facing page. The various columns are probably self explanatory. Where the NO!'s are shown—in the next to last column we need your help with a copy of the Chapman portion from an index of that state. We need all the information shown in the index such as name, county, township, and page number. This will be the first part completed and should show us how many Chapman families were in the United States, according to the census, in 1850. It will show the number by state and as a national total.

The next part of the project will show, by state, how many Chapman families were in each county, and it will keep an account of how many of them on which we have the detailed family data. The first version, showing the data from the states on which we have an index will be in the next issue. As we obtain new information on each state we will include it in CHAPMAN CHAITER, but we will not repeat a state for the purpose of keeping up with our detailed data.

When all the state indexes are in the record we will prepare a national index listing every. Chapman family (head of family) in the 1850 census showing his state and township and the page of the census on which his detail may be found.

Our inventory will eventually contain the family breakout of every family tabulated in the aforementioned products. We will not publish all of this in CHAPMAN CHATTER. This record will show, by family, each member with their age, year of birth (ca), sex and place of birth and county of census. For the head of the family it will show profession and property information.

Finally we will prepare a master list of every Chapman contained in the 1850 census. It will be alphabetical irrespective of family state etc, but will show name, age, year of birth (ca), sex, place of birth and county and state of census.

We will publish portions of this in CHAPMAN CHATTER, but space will not permit us to publish the entire product in one or even several issues. Those who have made a significant contribution of data to our collection effort (about 5% of the input or more) will receive a complimentary copy of the complete booklet. Other subscribers will be able to purchase a copy for cost. Anyone else may have a copy for the price which will be determined at the completion of the project.

Let us know if you want to actively participate in the collection of data, and give us a general lidea as to the resources available to you.

COMPUTING COMMENTS

At the suggestion of several readers of our other newsletters we have been publishing this page about computers and genealogy. You can expect to see a similar page in each issue, age with comments about computing.

The single most important suggestion I can give to anyone considering genealogy with computers is one I have made to many of you personally. The suggestion is very important to those who have not purchased their hardware and software system. It is probably equally important to those who have made their purchase. The suggestion is that you subscribe immediately to 6EMEALOGICAL COMPUTING. That is a publication that is likely to save you much more than you will ever pay for the subscription. Buy and study the back issues as their content is important and as pertinent today as when the various issues were published. In fact, if you must chose between year 1, and the current year, get year 1. Their subscription price was \$14 a year for six issues, but it went up effective July 1 1983 to \$20. I recently sent in a two-year renewal. 6EMEALOGICAL COMPUTING is published by Data Transfer Associates, Ind., 5102 Pommeroy Dr., Fairfax, VA 22032. I have no personal interest or involvement with this publication or their editors and have never been in contact with them except to subscribe and to renew.

In a recent issue of the publication they had their 1983 Reader Survey Report. Most of the remainder of this page comes from that report. The editors make an important point on the front page. When you are considering buying a computer system, don't run out and buy the one that is currently the most popular one in use. Although it is not obsolete there is a later model available. The two most popular computers in use in genealogy (by 6C's readers) is the Apple II followed by the TRS-80 Model I (followed closely by Model III). The state of the art computers to buy from these two families today would be the Apple IIe or the TRS-80 Model 4. As you read, many of you will wonder what system we are using. It is an Atari 800 with a single disk drive and an Epson MX-80F/T graphics printer. Not of of the "biggies." Now lets go ahead and look at what the 6C readers have.

The Apple II is the most popular with 138 readers reporting having one. There are 10 Apple IIe's and 7 Apple III's. A recent home computer comparison in INFONORLB showed the basic price of the Apple IIe to be \$1395 with 64K RAM. Basic prices normally do not include the cost of many items of peripheral equipment which will be required to make a complete system. In 6C's reader survey the average Apple IIe system in use cost the user \$2933, with the high being \$5000 and the low \$2000. By comparison, the Apple II, the most popular system, had an average user cost of \$3542 with a high of \$7000 and a low of \$700 (he must have made some kind of deal). Some of the costs of the necessary accesories are: floppy disk drive, \$395; 12-inch green monitor (TV Screen), \$249; Dot-matrix printer (that is what I use for the newsletter), \$695; Letter-quality printer, \$2195. There is probably more software available for the Apple than for any other system. Each issue of GC contains a table of genealogical programs available by computer system. There are six for the Apple II. There are no systems with more than six. In the readers survey we are asked to indicate our experience level as genealogists and computerists by Novice, Experienced or Professional. In the largests groups reporting, ninety-two or 59% of the Apple users said they were experienced genealogists and 74 or 47% said they were novice computerists.

Lets take a comparable look at the TRS 80 computers. If you are not just a little bit computer smart, then you may not know that this is the computer made and distributed by the Radio Shack stores. There are currently five 80 models in use: I, II, III, 16 and the color computer. The numbers reported by GC readers are 71, 29, 69, 7 and 16 respectively. INFONORID also gave basic prices for two of these. The Model III is \$999 with 16K of RAM expandable to 48K for \$299 per 16K. The color computer is \$399.95 with expansion similar as the Model III. If you don't know about the K's of RAM, get smart because it may turn out to be your single most significant constraint. It is mine. The model III has a built in monitor. The color computer depends on your color TV as a monitor. Although disk drives are "built-in", they are priced separately, \$849 for the Model III. According to the GC's reader survey the average system cost for the Model III was \$3355 with a high of \$6500 and low of \$1000. For the color computer the average was \$1262 with a high of \$2000 and low of \$300. GC's table of genealogical programs available show six for the model III and two for the color computer. The largest group reporting on their genealogical experience were those who considered themselves to be experienced and there were 123 or 64% of those reporting. As computerists, the largest group were the novice with 73 or 38% of those reporting.
